ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

The Board takes the opportunity of recording its appreciation of the loyalty and dedication displayed by its employees, and of the assistance and co-operation of coffee growers and related organisations which contributed to the industry's activities during the year.

STAFF

Miss Delores Graham, Assistant Chief Accountant, resigned with effect from 31st October, 1992, after nine years of employment at CIB/CIDCo and Mr. Austin Baldie, Chief Accountant, also resigned with effect from 26th October, 1992 after ten years of employment at the CIB.

PRODUCTION AND DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

Production

National coffee production for the year under review fell to 433,280 boxes from 496,000 in the previous year. This decline is attributed to a combination of drought conditions experienced in the previous year as well as an increased incidence of leaf miner infestation.

Claverty Cottage/Shirley Castle 3,500 acres Blue Mtn. Coffee Development Programme

This programme, jointly funded by the Governments of Japan and Jamaica, began in October 1984.

For the 1992/93 crop year, total establishment on the CIB's mother farm at Peters Hill in the Parish of Portland was 66 acres, while private farmers planted 436 acres, bringing establishment for the year to 502 acres. Overall establishment to 31st July, 1993, was 2,530 acres.

Plans for resumption of work on the construction of a Central Grading and Finishing Plant at Tarentum in the parish of Clarendon were continued.

European Economic Community (EEC) 1,500 acres Coffee Development Programme

Under this programme the European Economic Community provided a loan of ECU 3.3 million and a grant of ECU 200,000 for the expansion and development of high quality coffee production in coffee growing areas outside of the Blue Mountains.

This programme which began in 1986 was completed in July 1993. 1,376 acres (or 90%) of the target of 1500 acres were established. Establishment over the seven (7) year period of the programme is set out below:—

Price to Farmers

For the 1992/93 crop the Board paid J\$1,009 per box of Blue Mountain cherry coffee and J\$480 per box of Lowland cherry coffee compared to J\$1006 and J\$450

for Blue Mountain and Lowland coffee respectively, in the previous year. The marginal increase in prices was understandable in view of the high incidence of crop loss resulting from the high incidence of the berry borer pest during the year under review as a result of the cessation of a national crop care programme.

Industry Cess

An industry cess of \$64 on each box of Blue Mountain coffee and \$43 for Lowland coffee was charged by the CIB on the crop under review to assist with the cost of administration, crop insurance, extension and research.

Marketing

During the year exports totalled 17,577 bags of coffee, which earned US\$16,604,874.00. Coffee was exported mainly to Japan, the U.S.A. and the United Kingdom, in green bean form. Comparative figures showing the Coffee Industry Board's sales and value of coffee over the last five (5) years are set out below:—
